Housing Crisis in Palo Alto


- Demand outnumbers supply
 - Palo Alto is <u>6,000+</u> units short of its housing needs (PA Housing Element Update)
 - Average home cost is more than <u>50%</u> the avg. income (HIF)
- ➤ Housing prices surpass the avg. income
 - In 2024, 1/5 of buyers could afford the median home price (\$1.2 million) (Palo Alto Online)
 - People earning \$70,000-\$80,000 struggle to find housing in the Bay Area (HIF)
- Regulations and little federal funding make affordable housing
 unattainable (Alta Housing)





Effects of the Housing Crisis

- Teachers and other essential workers can't afford to live in the communities they serve (Alta Housing, John Fredrich).
 - Workers are forced to commute long distances (very costly)
 - Many are homeless or living in unstable conditions
 - Residents report more RVs and encampments, but
 reject permanent housing solutions (Palo Alto Online).
- NIMBYism blocks long-term solutions, even when residents say they support affordable housing (Palo Alto Online).
- **Lack** of teen efforts in the housing advocacy space




The aim of this survey is to assess community perspectives, concerns, and awareness regarding affordable housing in Palo Alto.









Survey Results

- Consisted of **9** questions \succ
- Received **113** responses \succ
 - **50%** upperclassmen -
- \succ **% students** expressed concerns about building affordable housing
- Gap between **concern** and **awareness** \succ





Presentation Results

- Presented for a Social Studies class
- ➤ Focused on:
 - i. Sharing survey results
 - ii. Background about the Housing Crisis
 - iii. Breaking down NIMBY stigma
 - iv. How to be a Housing Advocate
- Conducted pre and post survey:
 - 1-5 scale
 - How **concerned** are you about the housing crisis at a local level?
 - How **aware** are you of ways to support affordable housing in our community?

Results:

- > Concern level went from $3.33 \rightarrow 4.31$
- > Awareness level went from $2.08 \rightarrow 4.08$

Notable quotes from the surveys:

"Your point on making housing affordable so we can live here after college really spoke to me. Right now most of us don't have any need to be concerned for housing because our parents are in control, but adding that piece on how it will affect us changed my perception of the problem a lot."

"I did not realize how large of an issue affordable housing was, especially for teachers and service workers."

"I plan to advocate for housing by becoming more involved in housing issues and convincing my parents to vote for pro housing measures."

"I am unsure, but I am glad to know that there are organizations that exist if I do decide to put in the effort to advocate"

Next steps

- Share data and takeaways from experience to PACC/YC
- **Be** a pro-housing advocate in Palo Alto
- Continue to improve and do more presentations at Gunn
- Make the presentation adaptable to other Bay Area cities for other teens to use
