

INTRODUCTION

Research Question:

What can we do in the Bay Area to make it so students from all schools have equal opportunities for future success?

Summary

Many students, even in the Bay Area, are struggling with school because they are not being given a proper education. The most important element to success is that a student is confident in his or her abilities so that they can form aspirations for the future. It is also vital that students are in an environment where they can have that confidence in their academics. I have studied students in both Palo Alto (PA) and East Palo Alto (EPA) to better understand their confidence regarding the gateway for success they are being given.

BACKGROUND AND SIGNIFICANCE

There have been surprisingly few local research efforts to find solutions to this problem. However, much research has been conducted that shows low confidence and achievement levels in students from EPA. Innovate Today reported in 2015 that over 80% of students in the local high schools were underperforming in English and math, between 12 and 17 percent meeting the bar for both subjects in the Ravenswood school district. By comparison, 54% of students in San Mateo County are proficient in both English and math (2).





Research from Peninsula Press shows that parents are beginning to seek other alternatives after poor test results from Ravenswood. Notable complaints site lack of resources (including computers and textbooks) as the cause of underperformance (1).

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RESEARCH METHODOLOGIES

The Schools



Jordan Middle School (Palo Alto, CA)



East Side Prep (East Palo Alto, CA)

The Plan

- Sent surveys to one 8th grade history class at each middle school
- Combined 72 student participants completed the surveys
- Responses were documented on Google Forms
- Teachers Mark Allendorf (Jordan) and Jasmine Kelly-Pierce (Eastside) had their students respond to the surveys



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




DATA ANALYSIS AND RESULTS

It's interesting that the data did not necessarily produce results that many would expect. Confidence and commitment to education was ranked very close between students from both EPA and PA, in some cases even higher in the latter. This could be interpreted as a response to Eastside students attending a private school in EPA: they know that they are given a higher education for their area and thus are more committed to academics and their






It is important to note that Eastside Prep students are automatically given a gateway to a four-year college after they graduate from high school
