

### Background

- A student's learning is heavily impacted by their environment
- Cleanliness is one of the most important factors to academic success
  - Unsanitary schools lead to worse performance, such as on standardized testing (Ogbeba and Muluku)
    - "The learning environment determines to a large extent how a student behaves and interacts"




People who are distracted by an unclean environment (BYU)



### Background

- Unfortunately, high schoolers are not great at picking up their trash
  - Main reasons include inconvenience, lack of knowledge of its negative effects, and lack of caring
  - Teenagers tend to suffer little guilt over littering (ENCAMS)



Adults who admit to littering regularly (number is higher for teenagers) (ENCAMS)



### Background

- We talked to Kristina Granlund-Moyer
- She believes that the problem at the high school level is partially with motivation: the "everyone else is doing it" mentality"
  - It can be difficult to push an agenda that's against the status quo onto teenagers
- ...and with the idea that it's too big of a problem to tackle
  - "I haven't been able to find people that feel like it's a problem they can meaningfully contribute to" (Granlund-Moyer)

"The nature of teenagers, they tend to be either inward-looking or attuned to their own little group."



### Background

- We also spoke with the school's custodial manager, Luciano Hernandez
- He told us about the extent of the problem
  - "There's a lot of trash, just everywhere, you know. We [custodians] try our best, but as a whole we gotta do a better job. There's so much waste...so much waste in every department" (Hernandez)
- Frustrated with the student body for not simply putting their trash in the bins

Waste is "preventable, but, you know, it's like changing the whole culture."



### The need

- Average student doesn't know just how much of an impact a single piece of trash makes, because it is near-immediately cleaned up by the custodians
- More than half of the student body is leaving trash out → overwhelming for the small custodial staff
- Students don't tend to realize this, **not paying much attention to the custodians at all** (Granlund-Moyer)
  - No student asked could name a single custodian
  - Awareness of the custodians' roles and lives might make the student body more likely to clean up after themselves





### The need

- Not a purely local issue; many people believe custodial staff deserve more respect than they get
  - ""[Custodians] are seen as second-class citizens," [a parent said]. 'They take care of our schools and they're taking care of our kids. Their work should be valued more" (New York Times).
- No recent initiatives to increase custodian appreciation locally
- Gap: significant lack of respect for custodians → littering!



### Our initial idea

- We planned to arrange a longer project in which custodians wouldn't clean up after students for 2-3 days
  - Piled up trash → visualization of impact
  - Volunteer opportunity for students to help the custodians clean up the trash
  - Cons: campus hygiene and safety





### Our project

- We decided to instead hold the project during a single lunch
  - Supervised by custodians after during SELF postlunch
  - Visualization of littering impact → understanding impact on those who have to clean it up
- Also: video interview with Gordon Goodspeed, one of the custodians
  - Questions about custodial duties & experiences and about him as a person
  - Shown during the SELF class

"Learning what your impact is on the environment is social-emotional learning."



### Prototyping

- Prototyped presentation in AAR class
- Asked preliminary questions like the ones we planned to ask the final group of students
  - E.g. about their knowledge of the custodians' duties
  - Helped us form an idea of what the actual group would answer
  - Tips on improving clarity and ensuring honesty
- Asked what kinds of information about the custodians they think would be effective in the video interview





### Findings!

- The students followed our and the custodians' guidance very well!
  - Picked up the vast majority of trash across campus
- **Every** student who answered the survey who previously did not always pick up their trash said that their likelihood of cleaning up litter increased.
  - One person said that they were also more likely to clean up others' trash
- ""Thank you so much for the help, it helps [us] a lot!" - Nestor Vidonia, one of the supervising custodians











### How well do you think you know the tasks and duties of the Gunn custodians?

  - Used our video interview with Gordon Goodspeed
  - Hopefully becomes annual!
- Learned about: research and environmental issues, and the importance of interpersonal connection
- We hope that custodial staff are more appreciated in schools and other venues!
